

Choreographer Marie Chouinard is the Montréal artist known for her singularity of imagination and her ability to bring out the erotic quality of the human body. In each choreographed piece, she achieves "a miniature masterpiece of precision and a delightful span of intelligence" (Danser, Paris). Compagnie Marie Chouinard delivers an urgent, powerful, yet sensitive performance of two Pittsburgh premieres: Le Cri du monde and 24 Preludes by Chopin.

Now under the direction of Louis Robitaille, a former principal dancer with Les Grands Ballets Canadiens de Montréal, this eclectic company is making its mark as one of the leading contemporary neo-classical dance companies in North America.

O Vertigo

O Vertigo returns to Pittsburgh with the North American premiere of the company's 20th anniversary creation by founder and renowned choreographer Ginette Laurin. Known for work that is inventive, risky and imbued with an intense energy, Laurin seeks creative inspiration from not only her versatile dancers but also from an astrophysical sensibility that explores "the link that can be made between the infinitely small and infinitely large." Laurin's choreography captures the body's slightest movements and establishes her as one of the leading figures of the Montréal dance scene.



is an artist-run publication that originated in Montréal in 1998 with the intention of creating a more accessible, affordable, and spontaneous method of disseminating art. *Edition No. 11: Science Fiction as Social Commentary*, is a joint release between Montréal and Pittsburgh, coordinated by its founding member Hugues Charbonneau in Montréal, as well as Jen Morris in Pittsburgh. In addition to the publication's launch, an exhibition featuring all of the participating Montréal and Pittsburgh artists will parallel the Pittsburgh launch at the Trust's new gallery SPACE as part of The Pittsburgh Cultural Trust's Québec Festival.

Silophone -A Live Performance

[The User], a group formed by composer Emmanuel Madan and architect Thomas McIntosh developed an interactive, web-broadcasting musical instrument out of an abandoned grain silo in Montréal's old port, Quai des Écluses, by using a grain elevator, microphones and telecommunications equipment.

With the aid of communications technologies, the artists will perform by accessing the Silophone from Wood Street Galleries and transmitting random sounds live through the telephone. Once the sound enters the silo, it will resonate inside the space and then be rebroadcast back into Wood Street Galleries.

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
